Students, teachers, and District staff collaborated to plan and host the

4<sup>th</sup> Annual Share the Love Day which was held across School District 91 on May 17<sup>th</sup>. Featured literacy resources, "Be a Bridge" and "Dictionary for a Better World", were used by school staff to promote action-orientation as it relates to inclusion at the school and community level.



Students were also able to participate in a

Goosechase Activity, an online Kahoot (planned by EBUS students), a Mario Tournament, as well as other school-based activities.



#### Hundiyin 2nd Annual Rematriation Gala

In early May the 2<sup>nd</sup> Anual Hundiyin Rematriation Gala was held in Burns Lake. The evening featured a live auction, traditional meal, and musical entertainment. Student members of the Hundiyin Group also participated in a fashion show featuring many traditional garments made by designer Gladys Michell from Stellat'en First Nation.

The community center event drew an even larger gathering than last year with several hundred attendees, including several local Chiefs, many elders, families, Trustees and school district staff who came to show their support for the young women.

This endeavour was a huge success and raised over \$13,000 to support the girls' learning opportunities next year. Thank you to Leona Prince and Chrystal Vanderwijk for their hard work and

organization in support of the group over the last two years.

#### Communicating Student Learning

With provincial changes to reporting processes (formerly report cards and parent-teacher meetings), Curriculum Services has spent the year working to support the shift to "Communicating Student Learning". As we learn forward, spring marks an important time to do a status check on how the changes went, so in May teachers were invited to provide feedback through an online survey. The initial data was reviewed by PVP, and the next step will be to discuss the results in our next meeting with our partners in BLNTU.

#### Provincial Outreach Program for the Early Years (POPEY)

This month, SD91 hosted our final rural residency literacy visit with Jen Kelly, POPEY consultant. During this visit, Jen demonstrated a writing lesson in primary classrooms at FLES, GPESS, WKE, and DLES. The visit culminated with a Writing Workshop during the May 10<sup>th</sup> Professional Development Day. This workshop provided a day of rich learning, collaboration, and inspiration! POPEY will be offering their rural residency literacy project to other school districts for the 2024-2025 school year.

responsibilities), and Schools of Choice. We also engaged in a data review related to Indigenous Children and Youth in Care; this learning extended to our recent PVP meeting as we dug into the stories the data tells us about our work in support of success for children in care.

#### New Spaces Classroom Renovation at David Hoy Elementary

We are pleased to share that David Hoy Elementary School has been awarded \$141,020 in funding

through Child Care BC New Spaces Fund for a child care space creation project. Over the coming months, the school will have an extensive renovation completed in a classroom. Upon successful completion of this renovation, we will be able to open a licensed child care program with 24 new School-Age Care spaces (pending license approval). This means spaces will serve children from age four and up to grade six age. Stay tuned in the coming months for updates regarding this project and the anticipated grand opening. The renovations are expected to begin at the end of June. We wish to extend our sincerest gratitude to the Ministry of Education and Child Care and the federal Ministry of Families, Children

#### Project Chef in SD91 High Schools

The inaugural Project Chef recently concluded, and the results are in...success! Sixteen students from FLESS, NVSS, and LDSS spent two days extensively exploring the world of culinary arts. Our 'Partners in Education' from the CNC Professional Cook Program opened their kitchen and learning

spaces at CNC Prince George to offer an array of hands-on activities ranging from flambaying shrimp to preparing sausages. SD91 students were also assisted by the Professional Cook instructors/students in the initial planning and preparation stages for their starters, main courses and desserts for the meals they would be preparing on day two of the project.

Upon return from Prince George, student planned and ate dinner at the North Country Inn while also receiving behind the scenes access to observe the operations of a commercial food kitchen. Day two of Project Chef was held at FLESS with student teams working to create a full three-course meal. The CNC Professional Cook Program instructors and students made the trip to

Fraser Lake and provided hands-on support and feedback as the day progressed. A variety of great food was made by the students leaving the CNC instructors with some tough decisions; however, after much back and forth and multiple food tastings it was the LDSS team and their Japanese themed menu plan that ultimately received the Top of Class accolade.

As always, SD91 extends its deep appreciation and thanks to our 'Partners in Education' from the CNC Professional Cook Program, the North Country Inn, and the Four Rivers Co-op. Students are already looking forward to Project Chef 2025!

#### Before and After School Care: Provincial Pilot

As the province moves forward with fully integrated before- and afterschool care on school grounds, more families will save time, money, and stress. Three school districts have been selected for this initiative this fall: Chilliwack, Nanaimo-Ladysmith and Nechako Lakes.

This initiative will use existing school space, school district resources, and staff to provide seamless care without additional pickups and dropoffs for families. The District has been awarded funding for the next two years to bring this endeavor to life.
