


WELCOME TO THE 21 - 22 SCHOOL YEAR!

NEW FACES IN NEW ROLES: WELCOME



FRAMEWORK FOR ENHANCING STUDENT LEARNING

British Columbia's Ministry of Education has initiated a reporting process titled 'Framework for Enhancing Student Learning' (FESL). FESL "brings a formalized approach to the planning and reporting expectations for schools with a focus on enhancing student learning and

success. It combines accountability with evidence-informed decision making and system-wide continuous improvement to support equity of outcomes for all students in the provincial K-12 public system. The Framework also reflects a public commitment by Indigenous peoples, Indigenous rightsholders, education partners and communities to work together to improve student learning and enhance the intellectual, social and career development of all learners."

On Monday, September 20th, our students attended the first school-wide assembly in many months to connect with Cops for Cancer. Cops for Cancer Tour de North 2021 is an exciting annual event where law enforcement and emergency services personnel cycle across the coast of BC raising money for childhood cancer research and support services at the Canadian Cancer Society.

OUTDOOR CLASSROOMS WITH COMMUNITY PARTNERS

Our community partners continue to amaze us. Long-time SD 91 partner and local landowner, Richard Martens, has contributed a portion of his land next to Clear Creek in Vanderhoof for the construction of an outdoor learning site. Some of the construction costs of



this space are being covered by the Nechako Environment & Watershed Stewardship Society (N.E.W.S.S). The construction timbers will be milled at the FSJSS portable sawmill. The ITA will be assisting with labour costs with students working alongside a local contractor.
