EBUS Celebrates 25 Years of Serving Students Across British Columbia

EBUS Academy, SD 91's virtual school, has earned the respect of 1000s of students and parents across British Columbia, and most recently the Yukon. From their beginning 25 years ago serving primarily home schooling families in northern BC, they have grown



to be one of the largest distributed learning schools in British Columbia, enroling over 3000 learners annually. This is captured in EBUS's tag line, 'Learn in Our Community, Live in Yours.'

I recently had the opportunity to watch some Prince George EBUS students, many of them adults who had joined EBUS to upgrade course requirements to enter CNC or UNBC programs, speak about their experiences. Consistently they spoke about the personalized, respectful approach of EBUS and how satisfied they were with their experiences. FLESS Moves Career Life Connections 12 to a Classroom - shared by Brian Cross, FLESS Principal

This year, at FLESS, we changed our approach to Career Life Connections 12. In the past, this course was completed independently by students in preparation for their Grade 12 Transitions Presentation. Because we'd noticed an increase in stress and anxiety in our 12s over the years, we had started running workshops for our grade 11s in the second semester of grade 11 in order to lay the foundation for a successful grade 12.

This year, with the implantation of the new curriculum, we placed CLC in the timetable and students attended class three hours per week. The difference has been staggering. We have noted an increase in confidence levels, an increase in students with a very solid plan for their post-grad time, and the presentations this past week were spectacular.



On Wednesday, despite the -41 degree weather, each and every one of our grade 12s showed up for school and presented to a panel of staff and community members. 100% of the presentations were successful and demonstrated the time & effort the kids put into their work and their planning for the future.

We also need to recognize the work that our CLC teacher, **Barbara Zang**, and **Loretta Scarr**, one of our Learning Support Workers put into supporting this class. Barb is our school counsellor and for every hour she put into the actual scheduled class, she put in at least that much again outside of class helping the kids get ready. Loretta is a key piece of our intervention team at FLESS & was mentioned as a critical part of their support team by a number of our students.
