STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATES: GOAL 1: HONOUR DIVERSITY

HONOUR DIVERSITY Respect the strength of all diversities within our communities. Support the transformation of an education system that recognizes, celebrates, and includes Indigenous history, worldviews and perspectives.

HUNDIYHIN - GIRLS' PROGRAM

The Hundiyhin girls program started in November of this year, with an open house on November 1st. This program was a result of research conducted by the Indigenous Education Team with grade 8 to 12 girls at LDSS in the 2020-2021 school year. Students were surveyed with a series of questions about their experiences in high school and about their needs. The initial survey was followed up with in-person group interviews where the girls talked about what they felt should be included in their programming and also how they would like their program space to function.



An analysis of the surveys and the in-person interviews concluded that what the girls needed aligned with the teachings of the Nedut'en rites of passage for Indigenous girls. The foundations of this program are built on the teachings of leadership, mental health, physical literacy, and identity. Director of Instruction for Indigenous Education, Leona Prince, indicated that "What we hope to achieve through this programming is the rematriation of our girls. Women have always had leadership positions within our communities. What we hope to give the girls through this programming are the skills necessary for them to take up their rightful spaces within community. Included in this program are also opportunities beyond the K12 system. We hope that this provides another avenue for equity in giving our girls dignity, purpose, and options for their futures." Mesiy to Leona, for her dedication to students in this program.

EBUS ACADEMY

The school community of EBUS Academy spent the fall participating in numerous learning activities that truly demonstrate the goal of Honouring Diversity. Students and families were able to spend a day by the Stellaquo River on beautiful Stellat'en territory to learn about spawning Sockeye salmon, cooking Bannock, nature, and of course, one another! Students and families have also been able to visit Stanley Park this fall to explore the impacts of events on the people living in the Territories of the Squamish, Musqueum and Tsleil-Waututh Nations.

Mouse Mountain - Learning Together

The Mouse Mountain school staff have been learning together about trauma-informed practices and what it means to become a trauma-informed staff. At each monthly staff meeting, all staff have been learning about the ARC (Attachment, Regulation and Competency) model of interventions in a short learning session that is focussed on one building block. Many of the staff have further explored trauma-informed practices through collaboration, professional development opportunities and summer workshops. Learning about trauma-informed practice supports Mouse Mountain's social-emotional learning goal and helps staff to better support students.



NETWORKS OF INQUIRY AND INDIGENOUS EDUCATION (NOIIE) PROJECTS

The Networks of Inquiry and Indigenous Education (NOIIE) is a voluntary network of inquiry-based schools and school districts in British Columbia, with partner networks around the world. Using an inquiry-oriented, evidence-based approach to learning and teaching through the Spiral of Inquiry, teams work towards improving outcomes for all learners in their settings and submit their projects to share their progress in a spirit of generosity, curiosity and growth. SD 91 educators have had an exciting history of participation in NOIIE inquiry projects, and the work of our teachers has been featured both nationally and internationally! Inquiry proposals are now being accepted and we look forward to



showcasing this work in the coming months. Thank you to Director of Instruction, Mark Gauthier, and District Support Teachers, Roberta Toth and Michelle Miller-Gauthier for their continued leadership in this important endeavour.

SINKUT VIEW ELEMENTARY – RECONCILATION IN ACTION

November 10th marked a day of remembrance at Sinkut View Elementary. As an entire school, they painted rocks with images and messages of remembrance. After the ceremony at the school, staff



and students took the rocks to the cenotaph in Saik'uz, where

they met with representatives from the Saik'uz First Nation and laid the rocks at the memorial.

Many of our students and staff made a connection to the people of Saik'uz this day. This experience enhanced the connection to the land acknowledgments heard regularly and the cultural learning they participate in at school. In the words of Indigenous Advocate Nicole Arnold, "Snachailya, a huge thanks to all of you for making today so wonderful! It meant so much to the Saik'uz community, Dani (Mueller of the Saik'uz First Nation) and I had a great chat about how reconciliation equals restoring relationships and we truly saw reconciliation in action today!"

Careers Department collaborated to produce a documentary on Chief Kw'eh. Throughout this process, students learned about the life of Chief Kw'eh, his governance and about his current descendants. Students and guests (both online and in person) had the opportunity to ask questions about Chief Kw'eh and about the technical aspects of producing the film. Traditional drumming and welcoming were also part of the presentation. The event ended with all participants sharing a feast together and it was a true representation of



enhancing connections throughout SD 91 as well as the local communities. This event contributed to student success by having students participate in all levels of planning and creating this documentary. Congratulations to all involved in this impactful learning experience!



TEAM FEATURE: SD 91 SCHOOL BUS DRIVERS!

School District 91 is the largest geographical district in B.C with an area of over 70,000 sq km. The Transportation Department covers this area with 30 regular bus routes under the operation of a team of professional drivers. The Transportation Department currently maintains and operates a total of 53 buses, including 30 regular route buses, 14 spares and 9 activity buses all inspected, maintained, and repaired by our 6 mechanics. During the 2021-22 school year, total travel for our drivers was 992,187km! On a daily basis, bus drivers transport over 1400 students to 16 school sites. They are well trained and are required to hold a class 2 license with an air brake endorsement, valid first aid, and they must also take the Thinking Driver Safety Course.

The drivers play a very important role for learners as each driver takes the time to know the students they transport; drivers are the first face that students see to start their school day and the last one they see at the end of the school day. The relationships they form with learners is critical and plays an important part in student connectedness and well-being. The significance of this group cannot be underscored, and they are truly a team that works together to cover the routes and extracurricular trips that take place daily.
