We ask all our families and students to follow all the health and safety protocols to help keep our schools safe and open. During the first week our Inclusive Education department also took the opportunity to do some training and prepare resources for the remainder of this school year.

Rhonda Togyi, Catherine Tassie and Sam Mackinlay trained 60 SD91 employees in Nonviolent Crisis Intervention training. The program teaches staff to identify four behavioural levels and the corresponding staff attitudes or approaches to deescalate student behaviour. The courses underpinning is to promote care welfare safety and security for both learners and staff. Stephanie Lindstrom, our school psychologist, was able to train 6 staff to use as student assessment called the Woodcock Johnson to assess learners who may have learning challenges and may need to have additional intervention or support. By training school staff to do the assessment they can consult with our school psychologist and get program intervention ideas very quickly.


